Here are some details on what the students should wear:

Kindergarten and Grade One Concert (5:15 p.m.)

Kindergarten Students - They can wear their “Christmas best” with a couple of blacked out teeth. In order to black out teeth, follow these instructions- To temporarily black out a tooth, apply eyebrow pencil to a completely dry tooth. This will hold for a little while and eventually fades away. We would like parents to have this done before the concert.

Grade 1 Students - They need to wear their pajamas and slippers (if possible). We are singing a song about getting slippers for Christmas.

Grade Two and Three Concert (6:30 p.m.)

Grade 2 Students - They need to wear black and white and we will provide zebra ears and tails for them to wear.

Experts Recommend Children Practice Writing At Home Daily

Good writing takes practice and there’s never enough time in school for that. So experts recommend that students spend 15 minutes a day writing at home.

Learning to write well will boost your child’s confidence. He/she will be able to express his/her feelings and ideas. Writing is also key to your child’s success in school.

To give your child the regular writing practice he/she needs, ask him/her to:

- Help. When you write a letter, make a grocery list or decide the dinner menu, dictate it to your child. Have him/her write the words down.
- Journal. Get a journal for your child and encourage him/her to write in it daily. Suggest he/she write about things that happen to him/her and how he/she feels about them.
- Make lists. Ask your child to make lists of things he/she wants to do or things he/she needs to remember.
- Copy. Encourage your child to write down the words to his/her favorite songs. Your child may also enjoy copying down favorite quotations or poems.

- Record. When you take your child out, ask him/her to bring a notebook. In it, he/she should describe what he/she sees and experiences. Views from the car window or sights and sounds while walking in nature are good places to start.

Bilingualism Boosts the Brain at All Ages

Here is a recent excerpt from a CBC article discussing the brain building benefits of learning a second language:

Learning a second language benefits the brain in ways that can pay off later in life, suggests a deepening field of research that specializes in the relationship between bilingualism and cognition.

Mounting evidence suggests that learning more than one language benefits the aging brain.

Psychologists at York University in Toronto have been studying the effect of bilingualism on the brain across the lifespan, including dementia. They’ve learned how people who speak a second language outperform those with just one on tasks that tap executive function such as attention, selection and inhibition. Those are the high-level cognitive processes we use to multitask as we drive on the highway and juggle remembering the exit and monitoring our speed without getting distracted by billboards.

Student Citizenship is Alive and Well at AEL!

The phrase, "It takes a village to raise a child", is alive and well at Ecole Ardrossan Elementary as together - students, parents, staff and community partners - work to ensure students model the characteristics of active citizenship. As a 7 Habits school we strive to ensure students have the personal and collective knowledge to be empowered, engaged, ethical citizens who are accountable for their actions and support each other to be the best young people they can be.

As a safe and caring school we strive to have every student equipped with the self-knowledge and skill set to model personal responsibility and care and concern for others. To that end, the leadership and support of our parent community is essential and so appreciated. Our students also benefit in so many ways, from learning from classmates and from older students who serve as influential role models.

Community partners also play a pivotal role in modelling shared citizenship expectations. For example, Ardrossan Junior-Senior High School students participate in Read in Week and Concert Band activities. Our Grade Six students enjoy a monthly visit to the high school cafeteria next door so as to gain a sense of familiarity with the school and future classmates. Grade 12 students are sharing a writing journal with some grade 5 classes. Salisbury Composite students shares a Drama 10 Theatre Experience. Bev Facey student volunteers assist in a popcorn fundraising initiative to benefit our students. Ecole Campbelltown, our French Immersion counterpart, participates in a pen pals experience that supports student literacy development. A member of the Edmonton Police Service shared a Hallowe'en Safety presentation. The ATB Financial initiative established this year will assist students to gain a real world perspective on personal finance. Our parent volunteers share their expertise on many topics that enrich learning.

Inclement Weather

With winter upon us, encourage your children to dress appropriately for the weather. Should inclement weather conditions occur, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) will advise parents of bus cancellations using various communications tools, including automated telephone messages, details posted on the division home page (www.eips.ca), in the *Bus Status* section of our division and school websites, on our main switchboard (780.464.3477) and community hotline (780.417.8122), on Twitter, and through local radio stations. We strive to share all information by 6:30 a.m.

EIPS *Administrative Procedures 164, Inclement Weather* states bus service may be suspended when the temperature reaches -40°C **including** wind chill factor as measured by Environment Canada at 5:00 a.m. and/or due to adverse weather or road conditions. Bus service may be suspended on a region-by-region or route-by-route basis. When school bus services are suspended, schools shall remain open to students.

EIPS believes parents have the right and responsibility to make choices for their children based on their beliefs and perceptions of safety during times of inclement weather. Parents must use discretion when sending children to school during inclement weather, even when buses are running and schools are open. Ask Questions To Strengthen Your Child's Comprehension

Much of your child's school success will depend on reading comprehension. Comprehension is much more than having your child recognize the words he/she is reading. It means that he/she also understands the meaning of what he/she is reading.

To strengthen your child's reading comprehension, encourage him/her to:

- Summarize. Talk with your child about the material. Ask him/her to recall facts (such as characters, setting and plot), but also ask questions that require deeper thinking: What problems did the characters face? How does the story progress from beginning to end? Why did things turn out the way they did?

- Make connections. Ask your child what he/she has already learned or experienced that relates to the story. Is the story like or unlike others he's/she's read? If the story is about a mouse, for example, what does he/she know about mice that matches or doesn't match the information in the story?
- Solve problems. Ask your child how the characters were affected by one another's actions. Can he/she imagine things from different viewpoints? If your child took a character's place, would he/she make the same decision the character made? How might this have changed the story?
- Apply knowledge. Ask your child to explain the message or moral of the story. Did the author have a clear opinion? If so, what was it? Does your child agree? How can your child apply what he's/she's read to his/her everyday life?



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Questions & Answers

How to deal with my child's organization skills?

Q: I wondered why I wasn't hearing about the school events that other parents knew about. Then I opened my child's book bag. I found crumpled papers, a dirty shirt and a smashed up pack of crackers. Chronic disorganization is affecting my child's schoolwork—my child loses things and can't find what he/she needs. How can I help my child get on track?

A: There are costs to disorganization, as your son/daughter is already discovering. Luckily, a child doesn't need to be born with a special organizing gene. Organization skills can be taught.

Talk with your son/daughter about why you're going to help him/her get organized. Wouldn't he/she like to know where his/her homework is? Wouldn't he/she like to be able to find his/her math folder? Then follow these three steps:

1. Have your child give the book bag a thorough cleaning. He/She can "uncrumple" wads of paper. Together you can decide what's important and

what can be tossed. (And he/she can also return the forms his/her teacher is probably waiting for.)

2. Make sure he/she has a binder or a folder for each subject. Color code them so he/she can remember that green = science and blue = math. Everything for each subject goes in its folder.
3. Teach him/her that the first thing he/she should do every day after school is empty his/her backpack. He/She can put papers and forms for you to review in one pile, and things he/she needs to do for homework in another.

Your child might never be super organized, but now he'll/she'll be able to find his/her math homework!

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Parent Involvement In Decisions About Their Child's Education

Ecole Ardrossan Elementary staff welcome parent involvement in decisions about their child's education in many ways. Our parents are positive advocates for their child as we recognize that academic, social, behavioral and citizenship learning is a learning journey. Our staff recognize that the home is the child's most influential teacher and the school works to support the home. Parents often stop by to visit with teachers and administration at the beginning of the school year to share important information regarding their child to help ensure the school year is off to a great start. Parental input and monitoring feedback for individual student learning plans is also regularly included for students who can benefit from additional learning goal supports.

We welcome parental sharing of their child's strengths, abilities and passions throughout the year as our staff work with families to support student learning both at home and school. The involvement of parents in monitoring student progress through regular use of student agendas, student-parent-teacher interviews, homework practice and communication with the home - initiated either by the parent or teacher - are important as together we can encourage students to achieve their personal best. Students bring different abilities and talents to learning and do not all learn in the same way and at the same pace. As well, students bring different experiences and skills to developing friendships and relationships within the classroom setting, the playground and the bus ride to and from school. Hence, developing friendship skills and social learning is an understandable learning challenge for young people as they develop the skills of

empathy and shared accountability for themselves and others.

Parents are encouraged to attend and participate in classroom activities and to volunteer in the classroom to gain a greater understanding of their child's growth and development within the classroom setting. Parents often have unique skills and talents that can enrich the learning program that takes place within the classroom. Parents are also encouraged to attend and participate in school wide events such as Terry Fox, Hallowe'en Safety, Remembrance Day, 7 Habits Assemblies, Christmas Concerts, Carnival, Sports Days, etc. and in that way help in celebration of the accepting, learning culture we strive to foster for all students and families.

Parent involvement and advocacy for children is important and sharing of information and advice for administration and staff is encouraged through School Council and Canadian Parents for French. Our school is fortunate to have amazing committed parent volunteers that enhance programs and events on a daily basis. We are always looking for volunteers. Do join us!

When parents are involved in what their child is learning or experiencing in the classroom, on the playground and on the bus ride it sends a positive message that daily learning and growing as a person is important. Parent involvement in their child's education sends a positive and caring message that no problem or challenge is impossible when people problem solve together, establish a plan and choose to celebrate successes along the way.

Thank you, parents, for being such caring, compassionate role models who are involved for the learning benefit of your child and all children in our community.
