Kindergarten Registration Now Open!

Do you have, or know, a child starting Kindergarten in the fall of 2016? If so, registration for the 2016–2017 school year is now open ☺

To help families prepare, EIPS has compiled a wealth of information on its website (www.eips.ca/kindergarten). There you will find details regarding how to register, eligibility, dates to remember, how to find your designated school, programming options, what to expect, transportation and more. When registering your child, please remember to bring with you proof of residence, your child's name, and date of birth and citizenship.

To assist in planning for next year, we encourage families to register their new Kindergarteners, and make busing arrangements, if needed, by April 30, 2016.

NOTE: To be eligible for the 2016–2017 Kindergarten program, children must be five years old on, or before, Dec. 31, 2016.

Have you considered ECS French Immersion? Frequently Asked Questions...

What is French Immersion?

- The French Immersion Program provides students with fluency in speaking, reading, writing, listening and communicating in French by the end of Grade 12.
- French is the language of instruction, beginning in Kindergarten continuing to Grade 3 when English is introduced.

Why Should I Consider French Immersion for my Child?

Learning French offers students significant linguistic, academic and cognitive benefits:

- strengthens English literacy skills and listening skills;
- enhances problem-solving abilities;
- strengthens concentration, math, and the ability to filter out non-important information;

- provides students with more flexible, divergent, and creative thinking skills;
- delays dementia and Alzheimer's disease later on in life;
- provides graduates with more choices for advanced education and career options;
- gives graduates a competitive edge in the job market anywhere;
- broadens students' cultural life through access to literature, art, music and theatre;
- helps students to better understand the history, development and government of their country;
- builds cultural awareness and empathy;
- increases a student's feeling of self-esteem and pride; and
- makes learning additional languages easier.

But, We Don't Speak French at Home! How does that work?

- You are not alone. Most parents of French Immersion students do not speak French! In fact, it was non-French speaking parents who established French Immersion in the first place! Your child will do just fine whether or not you speak French at home.

Boundary Exemption Request Process is Now Open

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) boundary exemption request process for the 2016–2017 school year is now open.

Students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 wanting to attend a non-designated school in the upcoming school year can now apply to do so. All interested families must fill out a Boundary Exemption Request Form and submit it directly to their requested school. The application deadline is April 14, 2016. Boundary exemption requests received after April 14, 2016 will be declined. There is no late or secondary process.

Final decisions will be made by April 22, 2016.

NOTE: Students already accepted into their non-designated school do not need to reapply.

2015–2016 Parent Survey

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) is committed to ensuring all parents and guardians of students within the Division have a chance to share their thoughts on the overall performance of their school and the Division. One of the ways EIPS ensures parent voices are heard is by conducting regular surveys. In November, the Division invited parents and guardians to participate in an online parent survey. They were asked 15 questions about the quality of teaching, school leadership, parent engagement, and more. Overall, the online parent survey received an impressive 19 per cent response rate, with more than 3,170 responses from parents and guardians across the Division. 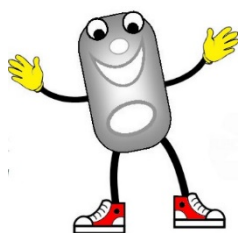

Strong Critical Thinking Skills Help Students Solve Problems

Your child is feeling overwhelmed by a big history project. Or they have gotten stuck while trying to figure out a math problem. What do you do?

Helping children understand how they think and solve problems is some of the best help a parent can provide. Strong critical thinking skills will help your child in school—and give them the ability to solve problems in the real world.

Help your child:

- Become aware of how they think. Educators call this metacognition, or the ability to think about the thinking process. Good thinkers have a plan before they take action. They know if they need more information in order to make a decision. And if they get new information later, they adapt their plan. Before your child starts a project, say things like, “Let’s think this through.” Also help your child see their strengths and weaknesses as a problem solver. “Remember that sometimes you tend to rush in before you make a plan.”
- Draw on past knowledge to address current problems. They may not have had to do an assignment just like this history project, but they have done other big projects. What did your child learn about how they work best?
- Focus on effort. “It’s not that I’m so smart,” Albert Einstein once said, “it’s that I stick with a problem longer.” So when your child gets discouraged, encourage them. Help them see the progress they have already made, and let them know they can reach their goal.

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Dress for the Weather

Thank you for making sure that your child has the necessary winter gear to keep warm. Students participate in outdoor recesses except in the most extreme cold weather. Hat, mitts and a warm coat are necessary during

outdoor play. We generally have indoor recess when temperatures reach -21 degrees Celsius or lower.

Absences

Thank you for explaining your child's absence when you call to report that your child is away. This helps with tracking absences as we report absences that may be in excess of 10% of the school population (i.e., flu symptoms).



Tackle Social Problems Before They Affect School Performance

"I thought she was my friend!" Unfortunately, the classmate who seemed so friendly only wanted to copy your child's homework.

Learning how to deal with "friends" who turn out not to be friends is a tough lesson. And it's one that can affect your child's performance in school and distract them from learning.

Talk to your child about the qualities that make a true friend and encourage them to stay away from classmates who seem:

- Selfish. Does the person seem to think and talk mostly about themselves? Is the person using your child in order to get something?
- Phony. Does the person say one thing ... and then do another?
- Dishonest. Someone who is friends with your child only because they want to cheat on a test is not really a friend at all.
- Unreliable. Did the person say they'd walk home with your child after school, but then headed off to someone else's house instead?

Remind your child that the person is worthy of real friends and should stay clear of those who are not.

When Parents Talk Less, Their Children Actually Listen More!

When your child was younger, it was important for them to hear you talk a lot. It's the way they learned the language that describes the world around them.

Now that your child is older, they need a lot less narration. Yet many parents of elementary schoolers find themselves talking on and on ... even while their children are listening less and less.

Of course you still want to talk with your child about their day. You want to have conversations about what they did in school and what their thinking about. But if you're like most parents, you'd like to spend less time talking about whether it's time to feed the pets or why their clothes are still scattered all over the bedroom floor.

Here are three effective ways to communicate with your child:

1. Make infrequent requests. As much as possible, help your child develop a routine for things like homework and daily chores.
2. Keep the volume down. Your child doesn't hear you any more clearly if you yell.
3. Keep it short. When you do have to give your child directions, see if you can limit them to five words. So instead of saying, "Jack, I need you to get to the car. Don't forget your backpack. Do you have your homework?" try saying, "Jack. Homework. Backpack. Car."

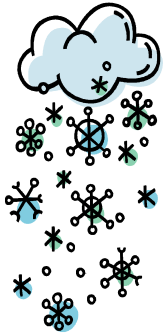

Inclement Weather



Be prepared is our motto! Always dress appropriately!

Should inclement weather conditions occur, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) will advise parents of bus cancellations using various communications tools, including automated telephone messages, details posted on the division home page (www.eips.ca), in the *Bus Status* section of our division and school websites, on our main switchboard (780.464.3477) and community hotline (780.417.8122), on Twitter, and through local radio stations. We strive to share all information by 6:30 a.m.

EIPS *Administrative Procedures 164, Inclement Weather* states bus service may be suspended when the temperature reaches -40°C **including** wind chill factor as measured by Environment Canada at 5:00 a.m. and/or due to adverse weather or road conditions. Bus service may be suspended on a region-by-region or route-by-route basis. When school bus services are suspended, schools shall remain open to students.

EIPS believes parents have the right and responsibility to make choices for their children based on their beliefs and perceptions of safety during times of inclement weather. Parents must use discretion when sending children to school during inclement weather, even when buses are running and schools are open.

Counselor Corner

In recognition of February 1-5 being proclaimed “Canadian School Counselling Week”, and that 7 Habits is practiced daily at École Élémentaire Ardrossan Elementary School, I would like to share a story with you about **persistence**.

There once was an insightful quote on a student’s Superman shirt, “Wearing of this garment does not enable you to fly.” This message suggest you can’t put on a different set of clothes, or act a certain way that betrays who you are deep inside, and expect to be successful.

The path to success involves persistence. Christopher Reeve, the man who played Superman in the movies, was left paralyzed from the neck down years ago in a horseback riding accident. But that didn’t stop him from living his life. By being persistent, he raised funds that will help others with spinal cord injuries live full and complete lives. He directed movies, acted and made speeches across the country.

Christopher Reeve talked once about the value of persistence. He said, “So many of our dreams at first seem impossible, then they seem improbable, and then, when we summon the will, they soon become inevitable.”

- ___4. Do you remind your child when they are struggling how they have handled tough situations in the past?
- ___5. Do you listen to your child when they are trying to make a decision without solving the problem for them?
